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Foreword

This document contains the Directory of National Data Items and Questions for Evaluation of Household Preparedness for Fire and Natural Disaster Emergencies. Throughout this document, this is referred to as the Directory. This document is separated into two parts; Part 1 explains how to use the Directory and Part 2 presents the actual Directory.

This document was prepared as part of the NDMP Impacts of Natural Disasters and Fire Emergencies project. For further details on the project, please refer to the report prepared by the ABS which describes in detail the methodology used for the development of the Directory and the contributors, available from the NSW Fire Brigades Strategy and Planning Directorate.

Acknowledgements

The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) was contracted to develop the Directory. The development of the Directory could not have proceeded without the contributions of a great number of organisations who gave up their time to comment at the workshops and consultations. For full details of those who participated in the development of the Directory please refer to the ABS Project report.

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Preface

Currently there is little information available to emergency managers and policy makers on how prepared communities are in the case of a fire or natural disaster emergency. Furthermore, current measurement questionnaires and tools are not applied consistently across Australia, and are primarily focused on structural fires rather than other hazard types.

PART 1 Using the Directory

1.0. Introduction

1.1. Purpose of the Directory

The Directory was developed to assist emergency management Organisations survey households, to better understand Australia's household preparedness for Fire and Natural Disaster Emergencies. It also aims to help inform decision making at the policy level by development of this nationally agreed directory of questions to measure household preparedness. The Directory will provide the means by which agencies can collect up-to date, comprehensive and coherent information on household preparedness.

Since risks and hazards, socio-demographic characteristics and preparedness levels vary across Australia, the development of one national "standard" survey template is not appropriate. The Directory is designed to provide flexibility, enabling jurisdictions and emergency managers to develop and tailor a survey template/questionnaire to their specific risks and hazards, priorities and requirements, capabilities, resourcing and funding. Each jurisdiction will therefore be able to develop its own survey template or questionnaire from the Directory's predetermined list of data items and questions. The ABS has advised that emergency services consult a professional in developing a survey, template or questionnaire. Data outputs from the survey/questionnaire can then be compared to other jurisdictions that have also collected data using the same data items and questions from the Directory.

These questions will provide a facility to ascertain how prepared households are for a disaster, and can be asked before or after a major disaster. To date there have been few surveys on preparedness of households or the community. Further, with hazards differing from state to state, current measurement questionnaires and tools are not applied consistently across Australia.

Use of the Directory by emergency service organisations will ensure nationally consistent and standardised data items and questions for the collection of data on household preparedness for fire and natural disaster emergencies. These surveys will therefore become the vehicle to collect information for assessing household preparedness for fire and natural disaster emergencies with a view to improving community safety.

1.2. Scope of the Directory

This directory was intentionally focused on household preparedness for Fire and Natural Disaster Emergencies. However, "preparedness" is defined in many ways.

For the purpose of this Directory, household preparedness refers to the measures that households have taken to ensure that they are capable of responding to and coping with the effects of a natural disaster or structural fire, and what resources and services they have used to be prepared for a natural disaster. The Directory is scoped to provide a means of measuring how well prepared households are, should a natural disaster or a structural fire occur.

Natural Disasters in scope for this Directory are those disasters included in the Commonwealth Government Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangement definition: bushfire; earthquake; flood; storm; cyclone; storm surge; landslide; tsunami; meteorite strike; and tornado.

The following disasters are excluded from scope as they do not form part of the selected definition: drought, frost, heatwave, epidemic or disaster events resulting from poor environmental planning, commercial development, or personal intervention (other than arson). Also excluded from this scope are those data items and questions relating to community preparedness for biological, radiological and chemical emergencies, medical emergencies, pandemic, agricultural emergencies and terrorist attacks.

In many of the newly developed question modules, the scope is explicitly presented to the respondents in the following terms: "bushfires, floods, storms, or other natural disasters," as during cognitive testing it was found that a long list of natural disasters made the question too long and caused confusion to the householder. However when asking questions of the householder, the relevant natural disaster is to be selected.

The Directory was developed through an environmental scan and briefing session, and consultation with emergency management stakeholders across all Australian jurisdictions, as well as through the development and testing of new question modules. For further details on the methodologies used in these phases of development refer to the Directory Project report prepared by the ABS.

2.0. Use of the Directory

2.1. Important information about the Directory

The Directory is intended for use by those organisations that plan to collect data relating to emergency management. It contains a list of data items, grouped by theme, which could potentially be used in a questionnaire. Suggested question modules are also included. The Directory is intended to promote consistency across agencies that may be collecting information relating to emergency management.

The questions in the Directory do not comprise a questionnaire. The suggested question modules have not been field tested in all cases, and advice from an expert should be sought before using these data items in a questionnaire.

The Directory is designed as a set of data items and questions modules which can then be selected and put together as a questionnaire. However where data items are dependent there is a need to ask these as a question module or a series of questions

2.2. Format of the Directory

This Directory contains a list of data items which have been grouped into four themes - Demographics and Dwelling Structure; Awareness; Precautionary; and Post Impact.

There are two sets of data items - the 25 new items developed specifically for this project, and the pre-existing items from the 2007 NSW/QLD/VIC/ACT State Supplementary Survey and the 2007 WA State Supplementary Survey. These items are grouped together under each of the themes, but there are some slight differences in their presentation. The existing items are presented strictly on the basis of individual data items, while the new items are sometimes grouped together where they are collected by one question module. There is also additional information in the 'Supplementary Information' field for the new items, such as development notes and data item linkages, and a more exhaustive list of caveats and suggested methodologies.

Each new data item is presented with the following headings:

Identifier

This is the unique data item identifier, used to reference any data item linkages or dependencies (e.g. where one data item requires another to determine its population)

Population

This is the subset of the overall survey sample to which the data item applies. The output categories reflect these different populations.

Data Item

The descriptive name of the data item or data items where applicable. In the course of creating some question modules, additional data items are sometimes created. These additional data items are included here.

Question Module

This is where the entire working question module is stored, including the question wording, input response categories, interviewer instructions, sequencing and word substitutions. Note that for most question modules, the final response category is "Other (specify)". This is simply a blank field to record answers that fall outside the set of prescribed responses listed. Where further examination of these verbatim responses is required, this is indicated in the accompanying notes for that question module.

Output categories

These are the categories which give meaning to the data collected for the given population. For simple items, the output categories will be very similar to the input categories (i.e. the responses available in the question module), but for more complex items requiring several questions to collect, the output categories may look very different. For these items, derivation instructions are included to allow several answers from a respondent to be coded into one output category.

Supplementary Information

Includes the following sub-categories:

Required Items

References are made to other data items that are required (e.g. other items on which the present data item is dependent).

Required Collection Method

Other essential advice about how an item is to be used correctly.

Caveats

Information is given about potential data quality issues.

Relationships

Show relevant links to other items which may be of interest (e.g. other items which might add value when collected in same survey, or similar items which contain a conceptual overlap).


Collection methods

Information is given about the suitability of collection methods, and the potential issues that could arise depending on the method used.

Development

General notes about why the item was developed the way it was, notes from testing, etc.

2.3. Conventions used in the Directory

Word substitutions

The question modules in this Directory contain word substitutions. These are alternative ways to ask a question depending on a respondent's circumstances or answers previously given by the respondent. The most common form of word substitution is the distinction between people living alone and people living in a multiple person household. For lone persons, the questions use the words "you" where appropriate. For multiple person households, the questions refer to "your household" or similar. Details about the conditions required for each word substitution are provided as part of each question module in the Directory. Where surveys are designed to be run using computer-assisted interviewing, the survey instrument can be programmed so that only the appropriate word substitution shows up on the screen for the interviewer. While this is the preferred method used for ABS surveys, word substitutions may also be used in paper-based questionnaires, and simply require greater attention and effort on the part of the interviewer to identify the appropriate word substitutions.

Interviewer Instructions

These are instructions usually included in a questionnaire to assist the interviewer with additional information, but are not designed to be read out. Interviewer instructions are labelled as such and *formatted in italic*.

Summary of formatting conventions

- Bold text is to be read out by the Interviewer. Note that question wording is always
 displayed in bold, and response categories are displayed in bold only when they are to be
 read out.
- Italic text is not to be read out, and is usually an instruction to the interviewer.
- [] When square brackets appear in question wording, the enclosed text represents a word substitution.
- () Parentheses within question wording indicates that the enclosed text is optional to read out (useful when there is no programmed word substitution available).

2.4. How to use the Directory

- i. Define the objectives of the survey. Decide what questions are being asked that the survey is intended to answer.
- ii. Decide what data is needed to answer these questions. Identify data items in the Directory that will provide this information.
- iii. Decide on a collection method. This will depend on a number of factors, such as cost constraints, the type of information being collected and the type of sample frame available.
- iv. Decide on sample design. It is strongly recommended that expert advice is sought when determining how the sample will be selected. The sample must be representative of the target population if accurate estimates are to be produced.
- v. Design the questionnaire. The suggested question modules provided in this Directory should be used to create a questionnaire. It is recommended that expert advice is sought before a questionnaire is finalised. It is also recommended to field test the questionnaire before running a full survey.

It is particularly important that advice be sought at the questionnaire design stage as not all items have been comprehensively field tested, and the sequencing of questions can affect the interpretation of questions and therefore the results. Since the particular data items selected for a survey will not have appeared together before, advice on context effects should be sought.

3.0. Collection methodology and other collection issues

3.1. Advantages and disadvantages of various collection methods

The collection methods shown in the final column in the Directory (see Part 2) indicate the methods by which it is possible to collect the data within the form of the questions and response categories presented. Where one collection method has significant advantages or disadvantages, this is indicated with an explanation.

It should be noted, however, that none of the questions presented have been field tested using a self-enumeration method. Where there are identifiable methodological problems with using self-enumeration as a collection method, this is indicated. But it should be noted that for all items, the inclusion of self-enumeration as a suitable collection method is a theoretical inclusion only, and is untested. This method should therefore be used with caution.

3.1.1. Face to face interview

Face to face interviewing involves a trained interviewer visiting the potential respondent in person, asking the survey questions and recording the responses. This method of data collection is very effective in terms of:

- establishing rapport
- high response rates
- high quality data
- using visual prompts (e.g. prompt cards or diagrams), and
- collecting complex data

Face to face interviews are, however, very expensive to conduct. There are costs involved in personnel, time, and other resources required to obtain, retain and manage an interviewer work-force. Travelling from one respondent to another is also a cost component in face to face interviewing. In the event that an agency chooses to contract this work out, these costs will still be reflected in the costs of contracting a research company to provide this service.

Data can also potentially be subject to bias caused by the interviewer's appearance and attitude. For example, if a respondent is approached by an emergency services worker and is asked about whether they have performed certain actions in order to prepare for an emergency, then there is an increased risk of that respondent giving an inaccurate answer to gain the interviewer's approval. This is commonly known as 'social desirability bias', and can occur consciously or subconsciously on the respondent's part.

3.1.2. Telephone interview

Telephone interviews involve potential respondents being telephoned and asked the survey questions over the phone. This technique:

- reduces costs compared to face to face interviews, as fewer interviewers are needed and there are no travel costs involved
- produces more timely results, and
- call-backs for people 'not-answering' and follow-ups for additional information are relatively quick and inexpensive

Telephone interviews may have lower response rates than face to face interviews, as it is easier for people to refuse a voice on the end of a phone. There might also be greater response acquiescence over the phone, that is, respondents feel less inclined to be a "good respondent" and will give the easiest answers in order to finish the interview quickly. The quality or scope of data collected may also suffer, as it is more difficult for a respondent to evaluate complex information (such as a long and detailed list of options) when there are no

aids (such as prompt cards) to assist. Where relevant, this issue has been highlighted for individual modules in the Directory, and options for each collection method are provided.

3.1.3. Postal survey

In contrast to telephone and face to face methods, postal surveys are self-enumerated, meaning that the respondent must complete the survey questionnaire themselves. Questionnaires can be mailed out to potential respondents with a return-paid envelope (this is likely to increase the response rate) so that the respondent can mail back the completed form. This technique allows:

- wider geographic areas to be covered for far lower cost than face to face interviews;
- access to 'difficult-to-contact' respondents those people who only provide post office boxes as addresses or are away from home a great deal;
- ability for respondents to select responses from long lists of categories, resulting in more thorough answers to those questions; and
- the respondent to complete the questionnaire in their own time.

The major disadvantage of postal surveys is that they have a low response rate. Questionnaire forms may not be returned by various households in the sample, resulting in a decrease in the accuracy of the estimates produced. The reliance on postal services and respondents completing the questionnaires causes data to be slow to become available due to the lag in time between when the questionnaire is mailed out and the time the questionnaire is returned. There is also a limit on the length and complexity of the questionnaire to avoid confusion or errors. This method is not appropriate for potential respondents with limited ability to read or write English unless questionnaires are provided in the appropriate language.

A variation on this method is for the questionnaire to be delivered to respondents by an interviewer who explains the aims of the survey and how to fill in the questionnaire. The questionnaire is left with the respondent to be completed and either mailed back by the respondent of picked up by the interviewer at a later date. This method provides higher response rates and better data quality than other self-enumeration surveys. The costs involved in using interviewers make this technique more expensive than postal surveys, but usually less expensive than face to face interviews.

3.1.4. Web-based survey

Web-based surveys are displayed on the internet via a standard format. The data entered in a web-based survey can be edited as they are entered, thus improving data quality. Questions can also be sequenced so that only the questions relevant to the respondent are visible. This format can produce a faster response than other self-enumeration methods. The disadvantages include increased cost in the development of a web-based survey and the need for respondents to be relatively computer literate and have easy internet access.

One major disadvantage of web-based surveys is that they often have a very low response rate. Another important issue to consider with web-based surveys is the method by which respondents are recruited. The sample design must ensure that it is representative and that there is adequate coverage. If potential respondents are contacted by phone or mail and asked to complete the questionnaire on a website, then it is subject to a similar sample design as other types of surveys. However if people need to be browsing a particular website, then this is not a valid sample due to self-selection. In particular, people who spend time on websites relating to emergency management are not likely to be representative of the population in general, thus making drawing inferences about the population as a whole impossible.

3.1.5. Any Responsible Adult methodology

Unless otherwise stated, all items in this Directory should be suitable for use with an ARA (Any Responsible Adult) methodology. This means that the questions can be answered by a proxy within the household, answering on behalf of the respondent. The common exceptions

are knowledge or opinion based questions, where it is unlikely the proxy will be able to answer the question with suitable accuracy.

3.2. Questionnaire design and sample design

All question modules used from this Directory will need to be analysed for context effects when placed in a questionnaire. It is recommended that a proposed survey instrument be field tested before running a final survey.

The length of the survey being conducted should also be a primary consideration. A survey which is too long, or places too high a cognitive burden on the respondent, can lead to reduced quality of answers, especially towards the end of a survey. It is sometimes good practice to first decide what constitutes a reasonable length of survey for the population being targeted, and then to prioritise data requirements to fit within that constraint.

One important consideration that needs to be decided upon before running a survey is the treatment of households that have changed in form or location in the reference period. It can be possible for a household to change its make-up during the reference period for example, by having had a person leave the household, or a new person join. This could be problematic if the person who left the household had certain characteristics that the question is asking about, for example, they have read information about preparing for bushfires when they were part of the household, still within the 12-month reference period. Also likely is for a household to have changed their address in the reference period, which could affect some questions such as whether the household has experienced any emergencies at their current address in the last two years. For the latter example it would have to be decided whether you are more interested in emergencies that occurred at the current address, or all emergencies experienced within the last two years, regardless of where they happened.

Once decisions have been made regarding these definitional issues, it is important to maintain this standard across the collection for the sake of consistency and comparability. Definitions should also be clearly communicated in any interviewer instructions so that interviewers can confidently resolve any problems or queries that arise of this nature in the field.

3.3. Data processing

Processing data collected through running surveys based on this Directory will require professional advice. Details have been provided in the Directory to assist with converting raw input data into useful output categories.

The following processing stages will need to be planned for:

- Cleaning and editing raw input data
- Recoding 'other (specify)' and open response text fields
- Deriving output data items (where several questions have been used to produce one item)
- Producing weighted estimates to align with standard population benchmarks
- Presenting the output data in a logical and appropriate manner

3.4. Data analysis

The desired data output should be decided upon at the outset of planning a survey. This information should be considered when designing the questionnaire and working out methodological details. This will ensure that the final aggregated data to be analysed, meets client needs.

4.0 Points to note

Organisations proposing to undertake research into household preparedness will achieve best results from choosing data items and associated question modules from the Directory and then seeking professional advice on the development of a questionnaire and other aspects of data collection.

The Directory provides a means for assessing how prepared households are for a disaster. However, the Directory does not include the full scope of possible questions to measure and assess household preparedness. The range of Directory questions may be expanded in the future, as knowledge increases about hazards and factors that influence and impact household preparedness.

During the development of the Directory, a large number of data items of interest to stakeholders were identified. Due to budget restrictions, however, only the 25 data items considered of highest importance were developed into questions for inclusion in the Directory. The full list of undeveloped data items appears in Appendix E of the ABS Project Report, which is available from the NSWFB's web site www.fire.nsw.gov.au.

5.0 Future directions

This Directory represents a significant step forward in improving capacity to assess household preparedness for natural disasters and fire emergencies. It now provides opportunity for:

- i. establishing base line data on household preparedness at state and national levels
- ii. running repeated state and national surveys to establish comparable time series data.
- iii. development of a centralised online database for the Directory to enable access to existing questions, the addition of new developed questions and even potentially the running of online surveys.

This Directory could be extended to cover household response and recovery in the event of natural disasters.
